Advanced Placement US History is a college-level course which examines the nation's political, diplomatic, intellectual, cultural, social, and economic history from 1491 to the present. Students will have the opportunity to earn college credit based on their performance on the AP exam on May 11, 2018. Additionally, students are required to pass the Regents Exam in US History and Government in June.

Activities that will be a part of this course:

- **Primary Source Analysis:** Students analyze primary sources where they identify, analyze, and evaluate each of the sources. Students analyze the sources for two or more of the following features: historical context, purpose and intended audience, the author's point of view, type of source, argument and tone. (Appropriate use of historical evidence.)
 - **Fishbowl Discussions, Socratic Seminars, Harkness Discussions:** These are all strategies that we will use to allow for deeper understanding of the curriculum. They will require students to prepare ahead of time, participation during the discussions, and active listening to peers. These activities will contribute to greater analytical skills which will be useful, particularly in essay writing.
 - **Historical Speed Dating:** Several times during the year students will be given different historical figures to research and "play" during historical speed dating events. It's a great way to share information with other students in the class.
 - **Six Degrees of Separation:** Students will be provided with two events spanning decades, but related by their theme. They will select six events in chronological order that link the first event in the series with the last. Students will write the name of each selected event, and use their research and knowledge of the period to create an argument to support the events selected. Students must emphasize both cause and effect and/or demonstrate continuity or change over time in their linking. This assignment provides students with the opportunity to observe continuity and change over time.
 - **DBQ Deconstruction:** Students, working in groups, will read the sources from and debate the question posed by the DBQ
 - **Simulations:** Occasionally we will engage in simulations of historical events or concepts. Some examples of potential simulations include: Articles of Confederation, Monroe Doctrine, Indian Removal, Mexican-American War, Lincoln's Funeral, Oregon Trail, Reconstruction Congress, Shark Tank, Dot Game, and Nixon's Trial
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Flipped Classroom:

The way that we have time for skill building, activities/simulations, and preparation for the AP Exam is by "flipping the classroom". You will be required to complete your reading assignment (choice between completing a Guided Reading or Identifies) and watching a video and answering questions on EdPuzzle. 95% of the time this will be your only homework for the class. By completing these assignments, it will allow you to have background knowledge on the topics that we are discussing in more depth with documents, activities, or projects in class.

Grading:

Your grade will be figured on a total points format. Your grades will be based on your performance on tests, quizzes, activities, and essays. There will not be many opportunities for extra credit, so you should put all your energy into required work. When you are absent (for any reason), assignments given before your absence are due when you return. Assignments given during an absence will be due within the next two class meetings. Multiple Choice tests, Short-Answer Questions, Document-Based Questions, and Long Essay Questions will be graded based on an AP-style rubric.

Late Work:

Homework is due at the beginning of the period - NO LATE WORK WILL BE ACCEPTED ***If you are legally absent you will have 1 day for each day absent to turn in your assignment(s). If you are illegally absent you will receive a zero***

- It is imperative students attend all classes and arrive on time for each class. Missing one day of class can lead to missing an entire theme, concept, and historical period.

- If a student is aware he/she will miss class time, the student is responsible for makeup work and arranging the makeup time and work with me well in advance of the absence.

Readings for the Course:

- *Out of Many*- This is your textbook you will read at home. You will be required to complete guided reading assignments which will assist you in learning the course material and practicing the skills necessary to be successful on the AP Exam.
 - There will be quizzes based on the reading, some of these quizzes will be announced, some will be unannounced.
- *Documenting United States History*- This is a primary source document reader which also focuses on historical skill building. We will be using this during class.
- *United States History: Preparing for the Advanced Placement Examination*, AMSCO 2018 Edition: This is an OPTIONAL purchase, however it is HIGHLY recommended.

 - Why purchase this book?
 - It directly aligns with your reading guides that you will be required to complete throughout the school year
 - You can mark it up and take notes in it
 - It also aligns with the new curriculum, has test taking strategies and high quality practice questions
 - It also serves as a supplemental text with alternate, shorter reading assignments for each unit rather than using the textbook *Out of Many*
 - What are my options with purchasing this book?
 - If you are completely sure you will be taking the course and staying in the course, purchase the book now!

- If you are unsure about staying in the course, you can purchase the book once you are sure you will be staying in the class and borrow one of my books that I have in my classroom.
 - Just know that I do not have enough for every student to borrow a book so you might not be able to get one every day or exactly when you want one.
- If purchasing a book online is an issue for you, we can do an order through the school which would allow you to pay with a check or money order and not have to pay shipping. We would do this once the school year started.
 - The drawback of this option is that you might not get your book until well into October.
- I have a PDF version of the book available for everyone on Google Classroom under the About page. Although it is the 2015 version it will meet the needs for the class.
