Advanced Placement US History is a college-level course which examines the nation's political, diplomatic, intellectual, cultural, social, and economic history from 1491 to the present. Students will have the opportunity to earn college credit based on their performance on the AP exam in May 2022. Additionally, students are required to pass the Regents Exam in US History and Government in June.

Grading:

Your grade will be figured on a total points format. Your grades will be based on your performance on tests, quizzes, activities, and essays. There will not be many opportunities for extra credit, so you should put all your energy into required work. When you are absent (for any reason), assignments given before your absence are due when you return. Assignments given during an absence will be due within the next two class meetings. Multiple Choice tests, Short-Answer Questions, Document-Based Questions, and Long Essay Questions will be graded based on an AP-style rubric. Extra credit: Students can only complete extra credit assignments if they have completed all of their regular assignments. So, focus on doing your best on your regular assignments and assessments.

Late Work:

Completion of homework assignments is very important to ensure success in the course. Often you will learn material outside of class which will only minimally be touched upon during class. If you are having difficulties completing your assignments, please contact me so that we can work on a plan to get you back on track! Official Policy: You can turn in your homework up to a week late. Any late assignments can only earn a max of half credit. Notes and IDs are checked in class, Questions are due by midnight on their due date.

There is a ZERO-TOLERANCE for IMPROPRIETY. CHEATING and PLAGIARISM WILL NOT BE TOLERATED AT ALL.

- · Arranging for makeup work is the student's responsibility.

- If a student does not arrange for a makeup within 48 hours, then it will result in a zero for participation and/or assignments.

- <u>Google Classroom</u>- This will have everything that my website has with the additional abilities to turn in assignments, engage in discussions, and ask questions. You will receive an email on your BCSD email to sign up.
- <u>AP Classroom</u>- This is where you will complete practice questions and receive your AP scores. You can also watch review videos to help you understand the course material.
- <u>MrsClemens.com</u>- This is our class website where you will find your assignments, resources (including videos, handouts, and review materials) and everything you need to be successful in the course. There is also a page dedicated to Regents review.

Cell Phones and other electronic devices:

There will be times when we will use electronic devices in class: to look up information, play games, fill out surveys, etc. Other than those specified times, cell phones and other electronic devices (<u>including</u> <u>headphones</u>) should not be used or even in sight.
